SUPPORTS & SERVICES FOR FY2022

The DDRB has approved its Fiscal Year 2022 Budget totaling over \$20 million. The fiscal year runs from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022.

Funding priorities were established by the Board in December to meet critical needs for items or services that are necessary for the health and safety of an individual or program, and to provide a 2.5% market rate increase to existing agency contracts.

The information that follows provides a break-out, by agency, describing each service funded by the DDRB, including the contracted amount. Keep in mind many agencies offer additional supports and services not listed here and the DDRB website provides a link to all contracted agencies for additional information at www.ddrb.org. Agency contact information is listed on page 6 of this bulletin and all agencies welcome inquiries.

COMMUNITY LIVING, INC.
CENTER-BASED RESPITE: Serves individuals ages 6-21 who demonstrate significant aggressive and/or destructive behaviors who may otherwise be at risk for out of home placement. The program allows the caregiver periodic relief from the responsibilities of caring for their child. Services are offered from 6:00 p.m. Friday to 6:00 p.m. Sunday.\$167,957

CONSULTATIVE BEHAVIORAL SUPPORT: Behavioral consultant services for children ages 6-21 who require behavioral

supports to participate in the SOAR and Respite Center programs.\$52,468

IN-HOME RESPITE: Periodic relief for parents from the responsibilities of caring for their child and offers opportunities to tend to their personal needs. Families choose their own provider.

IN-HOME RESPITE ADMINISTRATION:\$185,657

RECREATION: Community based recreation and leisure opportunities for adults. Individualized services are offered as needed.\$421,872

RESPITE CARE HOME: Out of home respite for individuals of any age needing short-term care for a minimum of 24 hours, including those with medical needs. Community Living staff authorize respite hours for families. DDRB funds assist in the daily operation of the respite home.\$377,820

SOAR TEEN PROGRAM: Social and therapeutic support services for teens aged 12 through the year after high school graduation needing protective oversight when after school, summer and school break child care is no longer available. Activities are offered to improve social, educational and recreational needs.\$1,335,574

BUILDING EMPLOYMENT SKILLS TRAINING (BEST) - PILOT PROJECT: Provides individualized skill building that address an individual's unique barriers to employment.\$89,669

FAMILY SUPPORT-PILOT PROJECT: Provides education, training, advocacy, and support for individuals with Down syndrome and their families throughout the lifespan.\$24,430

EASTERSEALS MIDWEST

EMPLOYMENT ACCESS: Individualized job readiness skills in areas of pre-employment, communication skills, volunteerism, work experience, job shadow opportunities, and transportation for individuals no longer in high school. Individuals receive between 4 and 6 hours of services per week.\$189,429

PEERS-PILOT PROJECT: Teens ages 11 to 18 learn and practice social skills that lead to healthy and meaningful friendships in this 14-week group session program. Parents also learn how to assist their teen in making and keeping friends.\$15,961

SUMMER TEEN EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM: A collaborative effort of area supported employment providers offering paid summer work experiences in the community to high school students with developmental disabilities to prepare them for employment upon graduation. The service includes job skill assessment and on-the-job training.\$278,991

FAMILY SUPPORT NETWORK-PILOT PROJECT: Provides counseling services by

trained therapists to families with a child up to the age of 18 with developmental disabilities to equip families with strategies that help to prevent incidents of abuse and neglect.\$32,519

FAMILY ADVOCACY AND COMMUNITY TRAINING (F.A.C.T.)

ADVOCACY: Supports individuals birth through age 21 with developmental disabilities and their parents by assisting them in planning programs and/or resolving issues related to education and community inclusion. Classes are offered for families and parents to learn effective advocacy skills and pertinent information such as the IEP process, various disabilities, communication skills and parenting techniques.\$480,045

FAMILY SUPPORT PARTNER: Families are partnered with experienced staff who are also parents of individuals with developmental disabilities. Through this shared perspective the parent partner helps the family navigate service systems to secure needed services, and resources that help keep families intact.\$749,573

PEOPLE FIRST OF ST. CHARLES: Creates new opportunities for individuals to develop self-advocacy skills that will lead to a better understanding of services available, how to access them, and how to advocate to solve problems and barriers experienced in the service systems.\$69,652

ADVOCACY: Advocates on behalf of offenders and alleged offenders with developmental disabilities by providing direct assistance. Provides education and training for criminal and social service professionals.\$128,864

ORCHARD FARM SCHOOL DISTRICT

ST. CHARLES COUNTY BRIDGE TO SUCCESS: A school-to-work program that provides total workplace immersion for students with developmental disabilities. Final year high school students participate in orientation at a business site and job training rotations before graduation. The program consists of a collaboration of business, school and agency staff. Participating school districts are Francis Howell,

Orchard Farm R-5, and St. Charles R-6.\$100,000

ADVENTURE EXPERIENCE: Provides vouchers that allow individuals 18 and over to access programs of interest while developing skills relating to independent living, social, leisure and community navigation that leads to greater independence in future participation across new environments.\$7,639

COMMUNITY ACCESS RECREATION

EXPERIENCE: Provides vouchers that allow individuals of all ages who indicate financial need, access to funding for organized community-based recreation programs. Individuals develop or enhance friendships and socialization skills allowing them access to healthier lifestyles in a community recreation program.\$34,904

INFORMATION AND REFERRAL: Provides a single source of recreation information within the community so individuals with developmental disabilities can participate in inclusive recreational activities.\$83,831

MINI-CAMP: Individuals of all ages have the opportunity to increase the variety of their experiences by attending two mini-camps (3-day camps). This also allows individuals to develop confidence and a higher level of independence away from their

support system, especially if this is a first time camp experience.\$1,167

PARKS & RECREATION PARTNERSHIP: A recreation inclusion specialist works with municipal recreation providers to ensure full accessibility and participation.\$72,347

PERSONAL CARE ATTENDANT: Provides for a personal care attendant to those who require personal care assistance to participate in summer day camps offered by local municipal parks.\$11,042

SUMMER OVERNIGHT CAMP: Individuals of all ages have the opportunity to access any residential (overnight) camp of choice that best meets their interests and support needs. Participants enjoy developing and acquiring skills that enhance their quality of life.\$21,218

SHOW-ME AQUATICS & FITNESS

AQUA-ABILITY: Physical and occupational water therapy, physical fitness, and motor development for children and adults.\$319,489

ST. LOUIS ARC

EMPLOYMENT TRAINING: Training for individuals ages 18 and over to acquire skills necessary for employment readiness through participation in career planning and exploration and job training at various training sites.\$111,447

EMPLOYMENT TRAINING:

A collaborative vocational training program to prepare individuals ages 18 and over for employment in the manufacturing and distribution industry or other work options of their choice. A 1:1 support ratio is also available. The program assists with acquiring, developing and maintaining the skills needed for employment through on-site internships for in demand positions. The duration of the training is up to 12 weeks or no more than 240 hours.\$120,456

COUNSELING SERVICES-PILOT PROJECT:

Provides individual, family, and group therapy for individuals ages 17 and older to learn, develop and gain insight into anxiety, depression, anger management, communication, grief, healthy relations and more.

UCP HEARTLAND

TALENT CONNECT: Collaborative vocational training program to prepare individuals ages 18 and over for employment in the hospitality industry. The program focuses on building direct job related skills, and soft skills that are employer led with the assistance of on-site training staff. Training is based at the job site with the intent to hire from the trained applicant pool. The duration of the training is up to 12 weeks or no more than 240 hours.\$32,062

FAMILY SUPPORT AND EDUCATION: Family and child supports are offered individually or in small groups and are designed to provide emotional support while educating parents about their child’s disability including medical needs, educational opportunities, sources of funding, equipment needs, etc.\$14,396

HIGH INTENSITY EARLY INTERVENTION: Provides intensive supports to develop skills in the areas of social interactions, communication, sensory integration and functioning within daily routines for children from birth to age 3.\$137,801

THERAPEUTIC INTERVENTIONS IN THE CLASSROOM—PILOT PROJECT: Provides additional services of occupational, speech, and Applied Behavior Analysis therapy for children aged 18 months to three years exhibiting significant deficits.\$81,600

WILLOWS WAY, INC.

PROJECT HEART: Health education and adult lifestyle education classes in a small group setting using curriculum specifically designed for adults with developmental disabilities.\$33,510

OPERATIONS.....\$5,941,717

ADMINISTRATION:

The DDRB is a 9 member volunteer board. The administrative staff report directly to the Board, providing accountability to the individuals supported, their families, and the St. Charles County community.

CASE MANAGEMENT:

Case Management is provided to individuals 16 and 17 years of age regardless of Medicaid status and to those who are 18 years of age and older who have Medicaid.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS:

ISLA—INDEPENDENT SUPPORTED LIVING ASSISTANCE

Provides services of up to 50 hours per month to support an individual to live independently in the community. Supports promote the development of skills for independence for the individual to stay in their own residence and access the community. ISLA service providers are: **Caring Solutions, Easterseals Midwest, and Willows Way, Inc.**

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT

Provides services of up to 6 hours or less per month to support an individual in competitive community employment. Individuals choose their service provider. Available service providers are: **BCI, Community Living Inc., Easterseals Midwest, MERCY, MERS Missouri Goodwill Industries, Preferred Family Healthcare, The Center For Head Injury Services, St. Louis Arc and UCP Heartland.**

CHILD DAY CARE:

Provides supports to students who require additional staff to fully participate in school break programs, before and after school child day care, including full day preschool before and after child care programs. Available service providers are: **Fort Zumwalt School District, Francis Howell School District, Orchard Farm School District and Gateway Regional YMCA.**
